Every Thursday morning, I receive an email from the World Health Organization with an update on the status of polio eradication. It contains a wealth of information, country by country: where and how immunization campaigns are being conducted, how many millions of children are being vaccinated, and where environmental surveillance have found evidence of circulating virus. But every week, when that email appears in my inbox, my heart seems to stop for just a moment until I read the first few lines – and learn whether a child was paralyzed by wild poliovirus that week.

That, my friends, is where we are today in the work of polio eradication. The question on my mind as I open that message isn't how many thousands of cases we might see in a year, as we did not too long ago, or even how many hundreds. Instead, when that WHO email arrives every Thursday, the single, binary question it answers is: Was there a new case this week, or wasn't there?

Thirty years ago, 1,000 children were paralyzed by polio every single day. Since then, I've marked the progress, year by year, week by week. I've celebrated as country after country, region after region has been declared polio-free. As they have come closer and closer to a goal, and the number of cases has dropped further and further, the chil-

dren those numbers reflect have become less and less of an abstraction. When I open that Thursday email, I don't wonder what number I'll see. I wonder, was a child paralyzed this week or not?

We are so close to eradication – but there is so much work left to do.

I ask our club to help recognize End Polio Now by marking World Polio Day on 24 October. Last year, thousands of clubs around the world held events to raise awareness and funds for polio eradication.

I would like us to try and plan an event, if it's possible if not this year maybe next year. I ask for your help and ideas. Let us all visit endpolio.org to find ideas, information and resources to help our club organize a successful event.

World Polio Day is a tremendous opportunity to highlight Our San Mateo Lions Club and to work to eradicate polio, in our own communities. It is also a great way to take advantage of the challenge from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation: For every dollar that Our Club raises for polio eradication, the Gates Foundation will give two more. Join me, and Clubs everywhere, on 24 October for World Polio Day – and Be the Inspiration for a polio-free world.

PSILC Veteran's Stand Down in Foster City, October 3-5

My mom and I attended the Peninsula Special Interest Lions Club Veterans Stand Down committee meeting on September 16. It was a fascinating meeting about the events being planned for the 3 day Veterans event serving at risk Veterans for medical, dental, legal, and other services. It will be held at Boothbay Park in Foster City on October 3-5. Unfortunately, I am not physically able to serve the event this year, but I believe we have a few of our members volunteering.

A Stand Down, in military terms, is when combat zone soldiers step out of the war zone to take time for themselves in a protected area for their health and welfare. This Stand Down is for our non-combat Veterans that for a weekend will receive medical, dental and vision services, as well as

chaplain counseling, legal assistance, housing referrals, clothing and other supplies. The schedule of events includes a program to teach disaster preparedness. Full meals and snacks will be provided. Reveille and Taps will be shared with the neighborhood each day. As camaraderie is a big part of the experience there will be musical entertainment and games for the veterans. Generals and Captains will be on site to maintain military discipline. The final day will include military dignitaries with a formal celebration of the lives lost from all wars that the United States has fought for freedom at home and abroad.

PSILC will have 80-100 veterans stay in tents on site for 3 days.
